

### Rue Hérold

This light-filled fabric shop is owned by Charlotte de La Grandière, who favours natural fibres, like fine Belgian linens, and Italian cottons and wools, mainly in neutral tones and sun-washed colours. They are sold by the metre, or you can commission bespoke soft furnishings. Find her modish textiles, such as velvet curtains, at red-hot Le Pigalle (see p022).

### Le Pigalle

This hotel is situated in a particularly hip pocket of Pigalle, which is known as SoPi in certain circles. It has a hyper-local ethos; art books are supplied by neighbourhood store Les Arpenteurs (T 53 16 47 96), the textiles are by Rue Hérold (see p086) and the ground-floor café/restaurant serves an all-day menu courtesy of gourmand hero Camille Fourmont, who helms La Buvette (see p048). Interiors, by Paris-based firm

Festen (see p054), are an eclectic mix, with a certain retro charm that extends to the lounge (opposite) and rooms – Pigalle 21 (above) has a leather-upholstered bar. Nearby, the Grand Pigalle Hotel (T 85 73 12 00) also draws a chic crowd.
